





Lake Steward Report

- Jim Hartog
- Water Testing Situation
- The 2021 Trent University water testing results are in and things look fine. Data as of Aug 3, 2021:
 - Secchi 4.5 m
 - Chlorophyll a 3.46 ug/L
 - Calcium: 7.44 mg / L
 - Phosphorus: 8.62 ug/L
 - Nitrogen: 313 ug/L
- The 2021 Lake Partner Program results are still not available but should arrive (rumour) by the end of May. There is significant overlap between the two. Both have Secchi, total phosphorus, calcium and chloride data and the Trent testing includes chlorophyll a. The redundancy is a good quality control check between the two. A difference between the two is that the Lake Partner Program samples are taken in May just after the lake "turns over" while the Trent sampling is done in midsummer after the lake has stratified.
- The test has been sent in for 2022 Lake Partner Program Based on just looking at the water off the end of my dock, all is well.
- Clean your boat before putting it into Loon Call Lake or when putting it into other lakes
- Stay vigilant. Take Care of Our Lake

- Margi Colquhoun
- Reduce nutrients and other harmful substances from entering lakes:
 - Embrace shoreline naturalization
 - Never use soaps & detergents in the lake / dilute household soaps & detergents
 - Use boating care protocols, never discharge black or grey water overboard
- Make <u>Cottaging Lightly Do's and Don'ts for the lake</u> a way of life for you and your cottaging guests

Be #WakeAware

- Reduce the impact of boat wakes on shorelines, loons' nests, swimmers
- Loon Call Lake boats should slow down in narrow channel beside the island

Shorelines are vital habitat. Throughout their lifetimes, over 90% of aquatic species use shorelines for food, shelter, breeding, and rearing areas.

Lake Health - What We Can Do Shorelines

- BeShore Haliburton (<u>beshore.ca</u>):
 - Working to require 30 metre zone of natural vegetation
 - "When we protect our lakes we're protecting all of the memories yet to be made"
 - Natural shorelines filter the waters that flow through them before they reach our lakes
 - Stunning natural backdrop for our lives at the lake
 - Natural shoreline requires minimal maintenance, protect against nutrient run-off and lakeside erosion






Deadline: No set time frame; however, the more support, the speedier the completion. Volunteers can contact one of two co-chairs at any time.
